2013 Tax Millage Rate 4.23

The 2013 Churchill Borough property tax rate is 4.23 mills. The Woodland School district rate is 26.21 mills, effective from July 1, 2012 to June 31, 2013. To calculate your tax responsibility, multiply .00423 times your home's assessed value for the Borough tax, .02621 for the school tax. A home assessed at \$100,000 would pay \$423 to the Borough, \$2,621 to Woodland Hills School District.

The Borough of Churchill tax bills will be mailed on or about March 1, 2013. The 2% discount period will be due by April 30 and the face amount will be due by June 30. Please make checks payable to Daniel R. Duerring, Tax Collector.



Recycling Comes to Churchill

Republic Services, formerly known as Allied Waste Services, was awarded a new five-year contract when their old contract expired December 31, 2012. They will perform both regular garbage collection and recycling services. Our collection day for both will still be on Friday.

Bi-weekly (every other week) recycling will begin on Friday, April 5, 2013. Please refer to the calendar to determine your recycling week. The recycling carts will be delivered to your home beginning the week of March 17. You may visit the Churchill Municipal Building, during regular business hours, at 2300 William Penn Highway to view the carts. A letter with a detailed explanation of the program will be delivered in the very near future.

Message from the Mayor

It is my pleasure to sign an ordinance that brings curbside recycling services to Churchill Borough residents. We will be joining thousands of municipalities around the country in an effort to give new life to household waste that otherwise would end up buried in a landfill. Please join me as we use the blue recycling container to recover our recyclable material, and also remember the first two steps. Reduce, Reuse, and then Recycle.

A HISTORICAL NOTE ON RECYCLING.

In 1988 Pennsylvania enacted Act 101 – "The Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling, and Waste Reduction Act," which mandated curbside recycling in municipalities with 5,000 or more residents. Churchill, and other small communities, were exempt in order to allow time for processors of recyclables to build capacity and markets. Now, we are voluntarily joining our neighbors in regular, curbside, recycling service.

Churchill has been recycling since 1970 at volunteer-run, school-based centers. Volunteers over the decades have included high school students, teachers, community members, the Churchill Area Environmental Council, G.R.I.P (the Group for Recycling in Pennsylvania), Churchill Kiwanis, and the Woodland Hills Key Club. In recent years recycling has been provided by the Woodland Hills Volunteer Center run monthly by local volunteers on the parking lot of the Woodland Hills Administration Building. The Borough recognizes and appreciates the dedicated efforts of all participants, past and present.

Land Conservation: Recycling minimizes the materials going to the landfill, thereby extending the life of our landfills. The average home produces a little over one ton of trash a year. 30-50% of this material is recyclable. The recycling collection and processing methods will continue to improve, with continued up-use of household trash.

Resource Conservation: Recycling conserves the world's scarce natural resources by using recycled materials instead of trees, metal ores, minerals, oil and other raw materials harvested from the earth. Recycled materials are recovered for feedstock of future products.

Energy Conservation: Recycling saves energy by reducing the need to process new material, which usually requires more energy than the recycling process. Recycling aluminum saves 92% of the energy required to make the material from scratch.

Pollution Reduction: Products made using recycled rather than raw materials use significantly less energy, which translates into less burning of fossil fuels such as coal, oil and natural gas. When burned, these fuels release pollutants, such as sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxide, and carbon monoxide, into the air.

Economic Benefits: Recycling programs typically translate into reduced waste costs for businesses. It is cheaper to recover 65 gallons of recyclable material than to send it to the landfill. Nationally, recycling is responsible for 850,000 U.S. jobs and \$86 billion in gross annual sales.

Fewer Greenhouse Gas Emissions: Recycling reduces emissions of greenhouse gases that contribute to global climate change by using less energy to make new products, reducing incinerator and landfill emissions and slowing the harvest of trees.

Recycling Facts

- The cost to manage waste is a function of how much garbage and trash is sent to the landfill.
- Each Churchill household averages a little over one ton of landfill trash per year. With a conscientious effort, 30-50% of that material can be diverted.
- Each person creates about 4.7 pounds of waste every single
- Each ton of mixed paper that is recycled can save the energy equivalent to 185 gallons of gasoline.
- Recycling 1 ton of aluminum cans conserves the equivalent of 1,665 gallons of gasoline.
- Recycling 1 ton of plastic can save over 7 cubic yards of land fill space.
- Over 25 billion Styrofoam cups are thrown away in the United States each year.
- Americans use 2,500,000 plastic bottles every hour and most and not recycled.
- Only around 27% of plastic bottles are recycled.
- Around 1 billion trees worth of paper are thrown away every year in the U.S.
- Recycled paper produces 73% less air pollution than if it was made from raw materials.
- Recycling half the world's paper would save 20 million acres
- Paper plus cardboard combined make up 73% of the materials in the landfill.

RECYCLING BEYOND THE CURB

Items that should **NOT** be placed into the landfill or the blue bin

- **Appliances** Gulf Trading and Transport 8th Ave., Braddock, 412-271-2575. The Appliance Warehouse 888-463-7366. Goodwill may accept small appliances.
- Batteries Batteries Plus–Monroeville. Rechargeable types ONLY - Forest Hills Borough Office or at Best Buy, Home Depot. Car batteries - Tyke's Auto Service, Inc. on Greensburg Pike.
- Books Half Price Book- Monroeville; C.C. Mellor Library paperback books for free exchanges. Churchill Borough office book drop.
- Clothing Goodwill stores or deposit box at Tyke's Auto Service, Inc. on Greensburg Pike.
- E-Waste electronic devices: TV sets, computers, monitors, keyboards, printers, cell phones may no longer be placed in the landfill. Manufacturers must collect and recycle their market share of items sold in the state.
- Garden Waste Consider using a mulching mower or starting a compost pile. Pick up a free copy of the advisory "How to Compost" from the Borough Office.
- Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Paint, cleaners, pesticides, or anything labeled "Toxic, Flammable, Corrosive, Irritant, or Carcinogenic". Periodic collection events: Southwestern PA HHW Task Force; Allegheny Co. Recycling-412-578-8047.
- Ink and Toner cartridges Return to stores Office Depot, Best Buy, etc.
- Leaves Utilize Borough leaf collection in the Spring and Fall. A separate newsletter will provide details.
- Light bulbs CFLs (compact fluorescents) hardware stores, including Home Depot. LEDs should be treated as e-waste. Traditional tube fluorescents contain mercury and should be double bagged with a dusting of "sulfur flour" (available at hardware/home stores) and put into the trash. Incandescent bulbs should also be bagged and discarded, no sulfur needed.
- Metal Scrap Gulf Trading and Transport, One 8th Avenue, Braddock, 412-271-2575.
- Metal clothes hangers can be returned to most dry cleaners for re-use.
- Plastic bags and clean wrapping film. Newspaper and grocery bags, plastic wrapping film-Giant Eagle, Shop and Save market or Target. Help reduce adding these to the landfill by reusing or minimize use of plastics above No. 7, which otherwise go to the landfill.
- Plastic peanuts and bubble wrap can be re-used or taken to a UPS Store.
- Styrofoam is NOT recyclable. Take your own "doggie bag" container to restaurants.

Electronic Waste

Beginning Jan. 24, 2013, desktop computers, laptop computers, computer monitors, computer peripherals, televisions, cell phones and any components of such devices may no longer be disposed in Pennsylvania with municipal waste. These items are toxic and will not be picked up by the trash hauler at the curb. Under the Pennsylvania Covered Device Recycling Act, manu-

facturers of covered devices must establish, conduct, and manage a plan to collect, transport and recycle a quantity of covered devices equal to the manufacturer's market share. Garbage hauling companies are prohibited by law from picking up electronic waste from the curb.

Recycling and Landfill Waste Frequently Asked Questions

When does the service begin? Are we required to recycle?

- The curbside service will be provided every other week beginning Friday, April 5, 2013.
- Blue containers used for automated recycling will be dropped at each home in mid to late March 2013.
- Churchill Borough is not mandated to recycle, and does not have a mandatory ordinance. We are requiring that every household keep a blue automated recycling container on premise and encourage its use.

How big is the blue recycling container?

65 gallons. Residents older than 60 years of age may request
a 35-gallon container. However, the 65-gallon container is
easier to manipulate because of its larger base, and holds more
material. Cardboard can get stuck in the smaller bin during
the automated emptying process.

What happens to our recyclable material placed in the blue bin?

 The recyclable material is taken to a processing center where it is sorted. Various materials are then sold as commodities. Cardboard is a valuable commodity that many municipalities lose when using small recycling bins.

What materials are recyclable?

 Please refer to the single-stream complete list provided. Briefly-all paper products including cardboard; metal cans, glass and plastic containers.

Do I need to sort recycling material?

• Sorting items is a thing of the past. Recycling is now "single stream". Everything goes into the blue bin.

How do I put the recycling material into the bin?

• Items should be placed in the container loosely. Plastic bags are not recyclable.

Do I need to rinse containers?

 Trace amounts of food on recyclable containers is OK and will be removed in the processing system. Some people do not feel comfortable unless everything is cleaned before it goes into the bin.

Do I need to remove labels from items? • No. Who owns the blue recycling container?

• The container is owned by Republic Services Inc., the waste and recycling hauling company. They are responsible for any minor issues with the cart, but obvious major damage or abuse is the homeowner's responsibility.

Our curbside service is automated?

 Yes. A special truck with robotic arms is used to empty the container contents. This requires at least 2 feet of space between the bin and another object. Otherwise the robotic arm may damage a mailbox, fence post, or retaining wall.

I am new to recycling. How is the best way to start?

- Store your cart in an area that is accessible and out of your neighbor's view.
- Start with placing paper products in the bin. Newspaper, journals, cut up cardboard, junk mail with plastic film re moved. Collect containers made of metal, glass and plastic in a paper bag. Some stores offer kitchen cans that enable separation of these items from your regular trash. Check out our resource tab at churchillrecycles.org.
- Check out our website churchillrecycles.org for items to re cycle, and other items that cannot be recycled.
- Remember to reduce and reuse before recycling.

Can I bag my recyclables before putting them in the cart?

Bagged in paper is OK. Bagged in plastic kitchen bags is not acceptable. The bags can be manually torn apart at the processing center, but it is an inefficient task.

Is Styrofoam recyclable?

Not through use of the blue bin. It is not a commodity that can be packaged and sold.

Is wood recyclable?

It is not recyclable at the processing center. It can be taken to Construction Junction in Point Breeze.

Should I replace plastic caps on bottles before putting them in the blue bin?

The processing center prefers caps from bottles removed and discarded with your regular trash. Otherwise, the bottle can be flattened and cap reinstalled. This will provide a flat bottle and make recovery more efficient.

Can I put garbage bags, grocery bags, or newspaper bags in my recycling cart?

At this point in time, they should not be placed in the recycling cart. They may be taken back to most grocery stores or Target. **How much is the fee for waste collection?**

The fee for recycling service is \$1.05 per month, which includes the recycling container cost. Landfill trash removal cost is \$10.95 per month. Total cost for refuse removal is \$12.00 per month.

How does this compare to the 2012 per household cost?

The 2012 per household cost was \$12.23 per month. This represents an average, as it was a tax rather than a fee.

How often will I be billed?

You will be billed quarterly by Republic Services, Inc. (Allied Waste). We suggest that you go to www.disposal.com to sign up for convenient auto-pay.

Why are we paying through a fee rather than through the tax budget?

Paying for waste management was taken off the budget in order to deal with anticipated revenue loss related to (former) Westinghouse Research property assessment uncertainty.

How common is waste management a fee rather than handled through taxes?

It is extremely common. A short list includes Edgewood, Forest Hills, Aspinwall, Turtle Creek, Plum, Shaler, Cranberry, McCandless, and Ohio Township.

I have no plans to recycle. Do I still have to pay the extra \$1.05 per month for this service?

Yes. We hope that you will consider recycling. Reducing landfill tonnage will help to reduce future waste management costs.

I am new to recycling. How can I learn more?

Additional education material will be mailed to you. Please take the time to check out our churchillrecycles.org website, and attend a "Trash Talk" seminar.

Exercise & Fitness Walking Program in Churchill

The Churchill Recreation Board is promoting a new program for fitness walking aimed at healthy living, especially for seniors, but highly beneficial for any age group. Regular walking is one of the most effective forms of physical activity, delivering substantial health benefits and improving heart health, according to the American Heart Association. Walking for as little as 30 minutes a day improves circulation, lowers cholesterol and blood pressure, and promotes proper weight. Also, for every hour of regular, vigorous physical activity, like brisk walking, life expectancy may increase by two hours for many adults.

As a highlight of the fitness walking program, the Recreation Board is initiating weekly, guided trail hikes in newly upgraded Bullock Pens Park. This "walk in the woods" program features a one-mile loop which takes about 45 minutes at a brisk pace to complete. Elevation changes, and a short, steep section at one end, require some hiking ability and footwear with good traction. Here you can be isolated from traffic noise and odors, surrounded only by peaceful vistas and interesting forest features. In the morning and afternoon you will hear a chorus of bird calls; if you carry binoculars and a bird guide you can spot many resident and migratory species. From early spring through autumn, the best time to go is in the morning.

To get this Bullock Pens walk going as a regular event, we are planning to meet as a group at the upper park shelter on **Thursday, April 18 at 9 AM.** Our volunteer "Park Naturalist" will point out early wildflowers and other harbingers of spring. A welcome kiosk is being installed at the park entrance; it will have more news, trail maps, and seasonal items.

ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL NEWS

An all new, up-to-date **advisory** on "**Energy Efficient Lighting**" will be available (free) at the Churchill Borough Building this spring. It has information on all the new light bulbs we have been seeing at the stores, with useful comparisons of their purchase and operating costs relative to each other and to the inefficient incandescent lamps now being phased out. Suggested uses for each type of new bulb are also included.

On Tuesday, **May 21, 2013** the Pennsylvania primary election will be held to select candidates from each party to run for elective office in the November general election.

Election Board Members in several Borough voting districts The Borough Office has **voter registration forms** for anyone 18 years of age by Election Day and **absentee ballot applications** for the incapacitated or for those who will out of town or away at school on Election Day. The deadline for new registrations is April 22, and absentee ballots must be received at the County Election Division by May 17. Call the Borough Office (412-241-7113) or the County (412-350-4500 if you have questions.

This may be "only" an "off" (local) election year, as it is sometimes described, but these local positions have the greatest immediate effects on our everyday lives. Vote on May 21st for the best candidates. Churchill has a long-standing tradition of installing candidate yard signs no sooner than two weeks prior to an election (May 7). Please remove signs promptly following the primary election. VOTE! If you are a registered Independent you will not be able to vote for party candidates in the Primary. You may, however, vote for referenda (if there are any) on the ballot.
