The black gold mulch will be distributed on Saturday, June 11 and 18 between the hours of 8AM-2PM at the Joint Compost Area, corner of Business Route 22 and Rodi Road. Bring your own containers and there is a suggested donation of \$2/vehicle. Delivery is available at a cost of \$10/bucket of mulch (2 buckets equals 4 cubic yards), plus \$30 for delivery.

Use the "black gold" (leaf mulch from the borough's Joint Munici-pal Compost Area) to control weeds on your property. First, cut down unwanted plants that are already tall.



unwanted plants that are already tall. Then, spray with an herbicide like Round-up or Weed-B-Gone. Follow package directions and dilution instructions if you buy the concentrate. (Never use herbicides on lawns unless the label specifically says the formulation is safe for narrow-leaved plants.) After a week or so the weed killer will have done its job (a second application may be needed for resistant plants) and it will have bio-degraded into harmless by-products, thanks to soil microbes.

Spread a 4-6 inch layer of "black gold" over the entire area to suffocate any seeds and plant parts that may remain viable in the soil. They will not have enough stored energy to grow up through the thick mulch layer to reach needed light. You can plant annuals, perennials, shrubs and trees in the treated area right into the mulch. Leave an unmulched "moat" around the base of trees so that rodents will not nest or feed against the bark.

"Black gold" mulch will not only help control weeds, it is a source of plant nutrients (use less commercial fertilizer), a moisture retainer (water less often), and a good source of organic matter that will improve the tilth (texture) of your soil. That's why we have dubbed it "black gold." It's the gift that your composted autumn leaves return to us each spring. Pick up your share in June and use it liberally. It even looks nice, giving a woodsy, natural appearance to your garden.

RECREATION BOARD - SUMMER 2011



AIR CONDITIONER


CYCLING: Local electricity providers like Duquesne Light are offering modest monetary incentives for permission to install a remotely operated electrical switch next



to the compressor on your air conditioner. In hot weather this device will cycle the unit 15 minutes on and 15 minutes off for 3-5hours on weekday afternoons and evenings ("peak" usage time). Most AC compressors are rated for at least 100,000 on-off switchings over their 20-year life expectancy. The installed relay may increase the number of compressor closures/openings 1,600 times (about 1.6%). This is not a significant shortening of the compressor life and there should be a reduction in your electric bill (in addition to the offered incentive) as well as an environmental benefit of fuel saving and greenhouse gas (CO2) reduction at the power plant.

INVASION OF THE STINK

BUG: The Asian brown marmorated stink bug is the latest insect to reach pest levels in our area, eating their way through vineyards, orchards, corn



INVASIVE PLANTS: This is the time of year to eliminate non-native, in-vasive weeds like garlic-mustard and Japanese knotweed from your property. Both species are easy to pull up by the roots when young,

although knotweed has underground stems (rhizomes) that persist and send up new shoots. Repeated pulling or mowing will eventually weaken the colony and get rid of it. The key is persistent vigilance. Round-up, Weed-B-Gone, and other herbicides



will also do the job and may be necessary if an infestation is extensive. Garlic mustard leaves are edible and nutritious. Google "garlic mustard recipes" for some tasty treats.

OAK WILT WATCH: Check your oak trees as their new leaves mature. If there is discoloration (off-green to bronze), wilting, or unusual levels of leaf drop, the tree may have a lethal fungal infection. Prepare for its rapid decline and death, and have it removed

promptly. There is no treatment or cure once the fungus is established. Healthy trees nearby can be treated with propaconazol by an experienced arborist (call the Borough Office for a recommendation).

CONTAINER CAUTIONS

WATER: Summer is mosquito season. Survey your property for any containers of standing, stagnant water. Empty and remove them. Even small saucers, tire rims, and toys can hold enough water for enough time to hatch out a brood of disease-carrying mosquitoes (think West-Nile virus!). All water features (ponds, statuary, et al.) should have dripping, circulating, or aerated (moving) water. Alternatively, stock a few inexpensive feeder fish (from Elmer's Aquarium), or toss in "Dunks" tablets (available at most hardware stores) all season. Dunks contain a bacterial larvicide that is harmless to animals other than insect larvae.


GARBAGE: A borough ordinance requires all garbage (food scraps, pet waste, and other organic matter) to be put into a can with a fitted lid for collection. This is especially important as summer temperatures rise. Odors can attract pest animals and scatter garbage in the area. Only trash (non-edible items) may be placed at the curb in bags or boxes. Better still, recycle these items!
