Most Churchill residents seem to have embraced single-stream recycling through use of the blue-bin. With a conscious effort to reduce, re-use and recycle, very little material needs to be sent to the landfill. Our efforts toward the goal of zero waste will reap future benefits in waste-hauling contracts and grant money.

The sorting of items at the recycling facility is automated. Plastic bags, including the blue compostable ones, can jam machinery. Lids and caps should be discarded separately from their container. Rinsing of items is not necessary, but may make a difference in the odor of your bin.

Recyclable material will have new life as future products. Please remember that cardboard has significant commodity value and should be cut or torn to a size that allows it to be placed in the blue-bin.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

Maintenance of our property is a reflection of our commitment and respect for our neighbors and our community.

A drive though our community is overall a pleasant experience. However, Churchill Borough Council and administrative staff are aware of several properties that are a significant eye-sore, and we are aggressively seeking to rectify the problems through the legal system. Borough Council updated its Property Maintenance Ordinance at the September meeting with the adoption of the 2012 International Property Maintenance Code.

Please consider your role in the aesthetic "curb-appeal" of our Borough. Garbage cans that are in view from the street need to be screened. They should not be placed at the curb prior to 6 pm on the evening prior to pick-up day, and then removed promptly. Yards

should have mown grass and be free of rampant weeds. Driveways should be free from clutter and debris. Broken windows need to be repaired promptly.

With a conscientious effort from its residents, Churchill Borough can continue to be a premier and desirable Pittsburgh suburban community.

Barking Dogs

It is not a yoga pose, but it is a neighborhood nuisance. Unfortunately, if you have a problem with a neighbor's dog that is barking incessantly, please do not call the Borough office. Instead, please use the 911 system and the dispatcher will notify the police department of the issue.

LEAF PICK-UP

Will begin Monday, October 13 and continue every Monday through November 17. Leaves must be placed in paper, biodegradable bags. Any other yard debris placed in the leaf bags will not be picked up. Put the bags at the curb on Sunday evening. Bags are available at the Borough Building or Tyke's Exxon Station on the Greensburg Pike at a cost of \$3.00/5 bags.

Please do not rake your leaves into the street. Leaf vacuuming is performed on streets, but is not meant to clean up leaves that are raked into the street from resident's properties.

FROM THE CHURCHILL AREA ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL (CAEC)

2015 Environmental Scholarship.

Each year the CAEC and its member municipalities (Chalfant, Churchill, Forest Hills, and Wilkins) award an environmental scholarship to a Woodland Hills High School senior. If you know a senior who is planning to do a project or has completed one within our schools or the communities they serve, please advise him/her to submit an application to the CAEC by the March 31, 2015 deadline.

OAK WILT, AGAIN?

The last time oak wilt (caused by a native fungus - Ceratocystis fagacearum) reared its ugly symptoms and killed trees in Churchill was four years ago (see Churchill Newsletter, October, 2010). There is some evidence that another surge of this aggressive pathogen may be building, particularly in the Royal Oak section of the Borough. If you have an oak tree on your property keep an eye out for the following symptoms:

- severe wilting of the tree crown.
- leaf color change from green to pallid yellow or bronze, especially in early summer.
- premature leaf drop, the top of the tree looking bare well before autumn.

There is no cure for the infection once it has taken hold, and death of the tree can be expected in one or two growing seasons. A few companies with experience and expertise (e.g. Bartlett Tree) can inject the fungicide propiconazol into healthy, non-symptomatic oaks as a prophylactic measure, something worth considering to save trees that add so much to the value of a property and the character of a neighborhood.

It is also wise to take actions that boost the health and natural resistance of trees to infection.

- Drip irrigate your tree(s) during long droughts. A tree needs at least an inch of water per week. Water in the morning to allow time for surface drying before the evening cool in which fungi thrive. Sprinkling the topsoil lightly with a hand-held hose is useless and may even be harmful.
- Feed your tree(s) in early spring and early summer with an all-purpose garden fertilizer (10-10-10) with NO added herbicides or insecticides. Follow package directions.
- Do not import or use "found wood" at your home. It may harbor the eggs of alien, invasive insects or the spores of pathogens, including those of oak wilt.
- Never prune an oak tree between April and November. Late fall through winter is best for trimming trees, while they are dormant and diseases are less likely to spread.
- Avoid injuring healthy trees with mowers and other equipment. If injury occurs during the growing season treat
 the wound with a wound sealant (tree "paint"). Sealants are not advised for general pruning (they seal in microbes
 and water) or during dormancy, but they may protect against oak wilt infection if applied to spring and summer cuts.



Registration and absentee ballot forms are available at the Borough Office. New voter registrations must be received at the Allegheny County Elections Bureau by October 6, 2014. Pick up an absentee ballot application at the Borough Office as soon as you know you will be out of town on Election Day or unable to vote for health or age-related incapacities. When you mail that application form to the County Elections Division, you will receive your actual ballot by return mail. The deadline for receipt of completed absentee ballots at the Division of Elections is 5:00 pm on October 31, 2014. It is best to start this two-step process early to meet that deadline comfortably.

Allegheny County Elections Division County Office Building, Suite 601 542 Forbes Avenue Pittsburgh, PA 15219-2953 (412)350-4500 The Borough has a tradition of limiting candidate signs to a two-week period prior to each election--that would be October 21 through November 4 this year. All signs should be on private property with the owner's permission. Plastic signs and their metal frames can be recycled at Construction Junction (Penn Avenue at Lexington St. in Homewood).

On Thursday, May 8, 2014, the Governor of Pennsylvania announced that he would not appeal a judge's ruling that struck down Pennsylvania's Voter ID Law, enacted in 2012. Therefore, voters in Pennsylvania will not have to present photo identification at the polls in November, unless they are voting in the district for the first time. Pennsylvania will continue with its current voter identification process, by which a voter's signature is compared to a signature on file.

If you do not have a Pennsylvania Driver's License, you can obtain a Pennsylvania Photo ID by visiting a PennDOT Photo License Center. The nearest one is in the Penn Hills Shopping Center off Rodi Road, uphill from the Giant Eagle Market. It is open from 8:30 am until 4:15 pm Tuesday through Saturday. The application fee is \$27.50.

MEAL ON WHEELS



Churchill Meals on Wheels is a nonprofit organization that delivers meals to homebound seniors five (5) days a week and operates out of Beulah Church. Providing an important service to residents of Churchill, this volunteer organization is always in need of additional manpower. The staff includes cooks, those who assemble the bag lunch, those who donate desserts, and the delivery drivers. Two to three times a month (about 2 hours) or any amount of time you can give, are needed. The smiles and gratitude of the thankful recipients are very rewarding. Bonus: Not only does volunteering bring out one's best qualities and make an important difference in the lives of others, it has been proven that those who volunteer are happier people, experiencing a sense of achievement and personal fulfillment.

Although there is a nominal charge for the meals, the actual preparation of the meals and the delivering is done by volunteers. Each day's delivery includes a "brown bag" lunch, soup, and a hot meal. Special diets can be accommodated to a limited degree, such as low salt or diabetic. The cost is \$4 per day, and you can ask to receive a meal any number of days each week. Meals are delivered between 9:30-11:00am, Monday through Friday.
