OCT. 1 (Saturday) – CHURCHILL TEAM WALKS TO FUND ALZHEIMER'S RESEARCH Churchill residents are invited to take part - as a community - in the Alzheimer's Walk at the Pittsburgh Zoo & PPG Aquarium. The Recreation Board thought that in addition to planning fun and informative events for our residents, we should also try planning an activity that would support a worthy cause. If this is successful, we will recruit a Churchill team to represent our community by participating in some charitable event each year. This year's Churchill Chargers team will help to raise funds for Alzheimer's Research by either walking October 1 at the Zoo or by sponsoring our walkers financially.

Alzheimer's Walkathon Questions & Answers:

Q: How do I join the walk or contribute?

A: To walk and/or sponsor a walker, visit http://www.alz.org/walk to register to walk with the Churchill Chargers' team, and/or to donate via credit card specifying our team or your favorite walker. Alternatively checks, made payable to the Alzheimer's Association, can be given to the walkers or dropped off at the Borough Office.

Q: How far do I have to walk?

A: Essentially you will be strolling around the zoo looking at the animals while wearing team colors and supporting this worthy cause. It could be a family effort. It could be a morning of exercise. It could serve as a student community service requirement.

Q: How much should I donate?

A: As much as you are comfortable donating. Walkers—it is suggested that you cover the cost of your zoo admission and parking, since those will be free if you arrive before 8:30am. DEC. 10 (SATURDAY) – TOUR OF THE FRICK'S FABERGE EXHIBIT & CLAYTON

A reservation has been made for a group of 20 people for the Frick tour of the Faberge Exhibit & Clayton. A major exhibition of over 100 objects made by the renowned House of Faberge will be shown for the first time in Pittsburgh. Part of the tour will also include Clayton, which has a special installation to connect with the Faberge exhibit, All That Glitters: Luxury in the Gilded Age, which will focus on decorative luxury objects in the collection highlighting materials, designs, decorative trends, and elements of the international style that was popular at the turn of the 20th century, plus select items from Frick's collection of 17th to 19th century Russian decorative arts. A group rate of \$14 covers the combined Faberge/Clayton tour. If you were to visit them separately on your own, the cost would total \$20 (Faberge exhibit (\$10) plus Clayton (\$10). The group rate of \$14 is a big savings for our residents. The Faberge tour is scheduled to begin at 10:30 am at the Frick Art & History Center, 7227 Reynolds Street in the Point Breeze area of Pittsburgh

An additional option for a few of our residents is a 1:00 pm lunch at the Frick Café. Since the Frick Café is small, they can accept only a maximum of 12 people for lunch (This will be on a first paid, first placed on the lunch list basis.) The lunch is a "Prix Fixe" cost of \$26 per person, which will include soup or salad, sandwich, dessert, beverage, and gratuity. Checks for the tour (\$14) and for the lunch (additional \$26) if you want to include that option also, should be made payable to the Borough of Churchill.

LEAF PICK-UP will begin Monday, October 31 and continue every Monday through November 21. Leaves must be placed in paper, biodegradable bags and placed at the curb Sunday evening. These leaves are taken to the compost site to produce the "black



gold" which will be distributed next June. Leaves will not be taken if they are in plastic bags. ONLY leaves will be collected and if other yard debris is discovered in the bags, they will not be picked up. Bags may be purchased at the Borough Building or Tyke's Shell Station on Greensburg Pike at a cost of five bags/\$3. They can also be purchased at stores such as Home Depot or Lowe's.

Once again all registered voters have the privilege and opportunity to vote on Tuesday, November 8, 2011 (7AM to 8PM). Many hard-working candidates are vying to represent you in the following positions:

Registration and absentee ballot forms are available at the Borough Office. New voter registrations must be received at the Allegheny County Elections Bureau by October 11, 2011. The deadline for absentee ballots is November 1, 2011.

Churchill has four voting districts. If you are uncertain about your district or poll location, call the Borough Office (412-241-7113). The Borough has a tradition of limiting candidate signs to a two-week period prior to each election – that would be from October 18 through November 1 this year. All signs should be on private property with the owner's permission. Plastic signs and their metal frames can be recycled at Construction Junction (Penn Avenue at Lexington St. in Homewood). Let us continue Churchill's record of high percentage voting!

AUTUMN ITEMS

ak wilt appears to be under control in the Royal Oak and other areas of Churchill where oak trees are common. Efforts to diagnose diseased trees early and remove dead and dying ones promptly appear to have halted or slowed the spread of this lethal fungus. Well-spaced rains this season have kept trees hydrated and less prone to stress and infection. Continued vigilance will be needed to stem future outbreaks. Kudos to all who worked hard on this issue in 2010-2011.

Bullock-pens Park has been upgraded and has a pleasant one-mile nature trail for your nature enjoyment, exercise regimen, or dog-walking needs. There is a covered picnic shelter, a water spigot (seasonal), and a grill for residents to use. Community picnics and guided walks have been sponsored by the Recreation Board each spring. Just obey common sense rules, including cleanups after your pet(s) and picnics (a waste receptacle is mounted at the shelter), and enjoy, but do not disturb the wildflowers, shrubs, and trees.

Household garbage (food and other organic waste) should be put into a secure bag inside a covered can before being placed at the curb for pick-up on Fridays. Loose items in cans often end up as a scattered mess. Garbage bags outside of cans can be pecked or torn open by wildlife, another unwholesome, unattractive situation. Take cans in promptly after collection. Only trash (non-edibles) can be placed at the curb in boxes or open containers. Corrugated boxes must be broken down and tied together. Rugs and branches may not exceed three-foot lengths and also tied in bundles. Call the Borough Office if you have special items, such as large appliances and furniture, to discard. Consider recycling newspapers, magazines, and junk mail at the Abitibi recycling bin on the lower parking lot of the municipal building. Most other trash items can be recycled anytime at Construction Junction. At the Borough Building you can pick up a copy of "The State of Recycling", a recent advisory from the CAEC for more ideas and places for recycling.

Litter is an ongoing problem everywhere. There are parkway entrances and exits as well as several state and county roads that traverse Churchill. Help keep our streets litter-free by picking up items discarded in front of or across from your property. Carry and use a litterbag as well as a pet waste container when you walk your dog. Everyone's efforts add up to an attractive, healthy area.

PENNSYLVANIA SENIOR CITIZEN TRANSIT IDENTIFICATION CARD

Applications for Pennsylvania Senior Citizen Identification Cards are now available at the Churchill Borough Office. Applications must be completed at the Borough Office (no take home applications), and must be made in person. When applying, the senior whose name will be on the card must present one of the following as proof of age: photo driver's license, birth certificate, armed forces discharge/separation papers, baptismal certificate, PACE ID card, passport/naturalization papers, Pennsylvania ID card, a statement of age from the US Social Security Administration.

Applicants should receive their senior citizen transit ID cards at their home address in 1-3 weeks, and cards can be used on most public transit systems in the state of Pennsylvania (check with the transit system if in doubt).

Senior citizens (age 65 or over) presenting a Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Senior Citizen Identification card (blue for men and yellow for women) or a Medicare card at the time of fare payment, can ride Port Authority service for free at all times.

Please note: bus schedules for routes servicing Churchill area, the East Busway and the Airport are available at the Churchill Borough Office.
