NEW CODE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

Starting March 9th Churchill Borough will engage the Turtle Creek Valley Council of Governments (TCVCOG) to conduct code enforcement on behalf of the borough. This code enforcement program will be a joint service program managed by the TCVCOG between Churchill Borough and Wilkins Township. The Code Enforcement department at the TCVCOG will be driven by data, using advanced in-the-field technologies that will allow for more efficient and effective enforcement capabilities.

Homeowners will be notified of minor, infrequent violations by way of a "Warning" hangers placed on the front door of the property. More severe or frequent violations will receive a "Notice of Violation Letter" issued by the code enforcement officer. In the event that a violation has not been abated by the time frame indicated on the violation, a citation will be filed with the Magisterial District Judge and daily fines may be imposed. The code enforcement officer will also be conducting occupancy inspections and issuing occupancy permits.

Effective code enforcement is important not only for maintaining healthy and safe communities for our residents, but it is also a proven tool to reverse the damaging effects brought on by negligent property owners. We are committed to taking proactive steps to ensure Churchill remains a safe and welcoming community.

2015 REAL ESTATE TAX MILLAGE RATE

FINANCIAL STRESS AT WOODLAND HILLS EMS

Woodland Hills EMS, the community based ambulance service for Braddock Hills, Chalfant, Churchill, Forest Hills and Wilkins Township, has



been hit hard in recent years by a combination of factors: high deductible plans engendered by the Affordable Care Act, lowered insurance payments overall, and patients that simply fail to pay their invoices for services received. At a recent meeting with community leaders on February 18, 2015, the pressures felt by the ambulance company were outlined by Operations Manager Keith Morse and Board President Paul Palko. They are asking for the community to help them maintain operations as well as creative ways to enlist better financial support for this important area asset. With annual operating expenses of over one million dollars, it is expensive to run an ambulance service. Employee payroll, insurances, equipment and the ambu-

lances themselves cost a great deal to buy and maintain. The Board of Directors at WHEMS has instituted cost cutting measures, but without increased revenues, the service is threatened.

One of the problems with high deductible plans is that in the beginning of every year, the insurance companies pay little or nothing for a service billing, leaving the patient themselves responsible for a bill that can be \$1000.00 or more. Coupled with that, the actual amount the insurance companies pay is seldom equal to the amount billed. The remainder must be billed to the patient. Subscribing to WHEMS during their annual drive can alleviate a lot of that bill, but not all of it. Unfortunately, over half of eligible citizens and families do not even subscribe to the service. Many do not pay their bill when it is received. The service is always willing to work out a payment plan, or help those who are truly needy, but WHEMS must still pay its bills. Insurance companies sometimes send the billed amount in a check made out to the patient, who then uses the money for themselves instead of paying WHEMS. These and other factors, lie at the heart of the financial stressors now felt at the non-profit organization.

What can you do to help this valuable community asset? First of all, subscribe to the service annually. This provides a much needed source of basic revenue to WHEMS, and helps you by reducing your financial responsibility if WHEM's has to help you. Secondly, if you need our services, please understand that we need that billing revenue to sustain operations. WHEMS has cut its budget as much as it can without sacrificing patient quality of care. If you can't pay the bill all at once, please make payments. Understand that those high deductible plans may cause early years bills to be large, so budget for that, remembering the lower overall insurance premiums you pay for those plans.

Finally, if you are able, make an additional donation to WHEMS. Look for upcoming fundraisers in local community periodicals and support these efforts to sustain WHEMS in our communities. Help us help you. For many years WHEMS has been a great asset supporting the quality of life in our communities. With your continued support, we will always be there for you 24 hours a day, every day.

CAEC has a new advisory for the spring of 2015. Titled "Sewage Overload Solutions (S.O.S.) - Part II: Now It's ALCOSAN's Turn."

This flier emphasizes the increasing cost of sewage conveyance and treatment. It outlines ALCOSAN's plans for compliance with the EPA Consent Agreement now that the municipalities have carried out their roles and met their goals for the past decade. ALCOSAN plans to spend over two billion dollars expanding its capacity to mitigate the sewage overloads that occur during wet weather sending untreated water directly into our rivers. Rates for sewage service have been rising by 11% per year and this will continue for at least two more years. If you have wondered about these increases this flier will explain it and suggest ways in which we can all help reduce the amount of water that flows from our property into ALCOSAN's lines.

Revisions to Allegheny County Open Burning Regulations Took Effect January 1, 2015

"These revisions will better protect public health and the environment, because wood

smoke emissions from open burning contain fine particle pollution and air toxics that can aggravate respiratory and cardiovascular health issues," said Health Director Dr. Karen Hacker.

The regulation in place since 1970, will be broadened to apply to any fire or combustion which occurs in a chiminea, fire pit, outdoor fireplace or grill as well as its longstanding application to any fire or combustion from which air contaminants pass directly into the open air without passing through a flue.

Other revisions include giving inspectors greater discretion to prohibit or reduce fires that are unhealthy or causing a nuisance; limiting the size of a wood fire to no more that 3 feet wide, 3 feet long and 2 feet high; establishing a setback requirement of at least 15 feet from the nearest neighbor's dwelling or inhabited area: and limiting material that may be burned to clean wood, propane or natural gas, with exceptions for charcoal in outdoor fireplaces or grills used for cooking and for fire logs, paraffin logs or wood pellets used in outdoor fireplaces.

In addition, the regulation will restrict recreational open burning, except for commercial preparation of food, on air quality action days, which occur when the Air Quality Index (AQI) indicates pollution levels are unhealthy. The AQI is available at www.achd.net, www.airnow.gov or by calling 412-578-8179. In 2013, there were 15 air quality action days in the region.

The Health Departments encourages residents to subscribe to Allegheny Alerts, a community notification system that can let them know when there is an air quality action day and open burning would be prohibited. To sign up for Allegheny Alerts, please visit www.alleghenycounty. us/alerts. The alerts are free and can be delivered via phone, email, text or an app to your mobile device.

Stricter federal standards for controlling fine particulate pollution, greater knowledge of the health effects of wood smoke and continuing public complaints about open burning led the Health Department and its Air Pollution Control Advisory Committee to work with stakeholders to revised the open burning regulation. Complaints about open burning account for 25% of all air quality complaints and residential wood burning contributes an estimated 19% to fine particulate pollution levels in Allegheny County.

The revised open burning regulation and other information related to wood burning are posted on the Health Department's web site at www.achd.net/air/.

Street Address Numbers

In the event of a medical or security emergency, it is important that responders are able to locate your home. Address numbers should be placed in a position visible from the street fronting the property. Numbers should contrast with their background, be a minimum of 4 inches in height and 1/2" wide.

There is a list of addresses in the Borough Office that do not want to be disturbed by solicitors. The solicitors are given a list when they notify us that they will be in the Borough. If you would like to be added to the list or to determine if your address is already on it, please contact the Borough Office by phone or e-mail.

Building Permit for Swimming Pool, Deck, Shed, Room Additions, etc.

Permits are required for some of these items. Please visit the Borough Office to obtain the necessary paperwork and to ascertain that you are in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance for side and rear yard variances. Any inside alterations changing the structure also require a permit. Citations will be issued for persons violating the ordinance.
