FAMOUS BLACK GOLD COMPOST DISTRIBUTION

Use this famous mix liberally as a mulch around all plants, including vegetables, flower beds, shrubs and trees. Leave a 6-8" mulch free moat around tree bases to discourage rodents from nesting and feeding at the bark. The black gold will continue to age, retaining moisture, releasing plant nutrients (minerals) and improving the texture of your soil.

Distribution will be on Saturday, June 6 and June 13. Pick up a supply from the Joint Compost site located at the corner of Business Route 22 and Rodi Road between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. Bring your own containers and there is a suggested donation of \$5.00/vehicle. Delivery is available at a cost of \$10.00/bucket of mulch (2 buckets are equivalent to 4 cubic yards), plus \$30.00 for delivery. Please contact the Borough office for delivery arrangements. **ALL ORDERS MUST BE PRE-PAID AND RECEIVED AT THE BOROUGH OFFICE BEFORE DELIVERY CAN BE MADE.**

2020 ROAD PAVING PROJECT

This project was awarded to Sciarretti Site Development at a cost of \$548,633.79. Streets to be paved include Barton Drive, Carlton Street, McCrady Road from Rodi Road to 3619 McCrady Road, Georgetown Place from Collins Road to Hollywood Drive, Kings Dale Road from 146 Kings Dale Road to Beulah Road, and Lewin Lane from Greensburg Pike to St. John Fisher parking lot entrance. Paving should begin within 6-8 weeks.

LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

Here is an update of some of the activities in the Borough during the past few months. Topping the list was the reorganization of our Borough Council. Three of our incumbent council members were sworn in for another

four years. Congratulations to them and their continued dedication to the running of the Borough. We would invite residents to attend a council meeting. Council meets the second Monday of each month in the Borough Building beginning at 7:00 p.m

The Police Department has gone through the process of hiring a new officer to replace a retired officer. We are hopeful that by the time of this writing, the new officer will be among our ranks. The Department prides itself with its service to the community and its residents.

Car thefts seem to be on the rise not only in Churchill, but in the surrounding communities. The police advises residents to make sure that your vehicles are locked at all times when parked outside. The Department also urges you to report any suspicious activity. Residents are the eyes and ears of the community and help in providing us a safe place to live.

Another area of concern is the speeding. There are no roads in Churchill that exceed the 35 mph speed limit and, through most of the residential areas, it is posted at 20 mph. Motorists continue to treat Greensburg Pike, Beulah Road and other neighborhood streets as interstate roads and drive far above the posted limit. We urge you to note the posted speed limits and stop signs. This makes it easier and safer for residents pulling out of their driveways or into an intersection.

Can you see your house numbers from the street? This is very important not only for deliveries but emergency situations as well. Please make sure your house number is visible either on your house or RD mailbox near the curb.

Spring is always a good time to begin the winter cleanup. Churchill prides itself with many manicured properties. Take a look around to see if there is an area of your property or a small lot that could use some cleaning. Overhanging trees and bushes are unsightly especially close to the road. You can take advantage of Waste Management's early summer yard waste collections. See their schedule for dates. Many people pass through our borough daily on their way to work. Reminder, your waste containers should not be visible from the street or your neighbor's side yard. Trash should not be stored outside on your property. As a community we want to present our beautiful homes and property in a way that is pleasing and inviting.

The Borough adopted a new budget for 2020 in December. There was an increase to help with the rising costs of infrastructure. All the revenue is earmarked for continued road paving as well as other issues caused by the flooding issues of 2019. Council has been working with the engineers to determine corrective actions. A Town Hall meeting was held last summer to give residents a chance to bring their concerns to council. Road paving will continue as planned during 2020 year. We have some catching up to do to achieve a planned

schedule for road maintenance.

You have probably heard by now that the former Churchill Valley Country Club property is in the process of being transferred to the Allegheny Land Trust. This acquisition will give Churchill a 148-acre green space. Things seem to be moving along. This could be quite a boost for the community in many ways. The Common Gardens at Beulah and Churchill Roads is getting a new facelift, thanks to the generous donations of the Churchill Garden Club, the Churchill-Wilkins Rotary and the Borough. We are planting a new design that will be easy for the volunteers to maintain.

The Borough maintains a website with information and updates. Please add it to your list of sites you check on a regular basis. Consider signing up for the Swift Reach Program, which will alert you to emergency situations in the borough. See the website for details.

Have a wonderful Spring and a great summer! The heavier and numerous rainstorms that we experienced last summer caused many residents to suffer from flooding. Borough officials and professional engineers have been working on solutions to the flooding issues. Plans are under consideration as to the best possible fixes.

We would like to thank our Borough Road Crew for the outstanding job with continual pothole repairs. Thankfully the mild weather has been kind on our roadways. We had to use less salt this season which resulted in a savings. This was good as the price of salt rose last season. This should mean less repair of potholes and using the money to repave roads which will continue this summer.

PRIMARY ELECTION DAY is TUESDAY, JUNE 2, 2020 and PENNSYLVANIA ACT 77

The Primary Election is on Tuesday, June 2, 2020. Don't be complacent in terms of getting to know the candidates and paying attention to deadlines.



Pennsylvania Act 77 was signed into law on October 31, 2019. This bipartisan compromise legislation takes effect for the upcoming primary election. This Act makes Pennsylvania a national leader with the following voter-friendly election reforms: mail-in voting, ability to request a mail-in or absentee ballot 50 days before the election, deadline to register to vote now 15 days before the election, and deadline for county to receive mail-in or absentee ballots now 8:00 pm on Election

Day. In

The 2020 Primary is when the men and women who want to govern us in Washington and Harrisburg will be selected from candidates competing within qualified political parties. On your ballot will be candidates running for the following offices:

Representative - Congressional District 18
Delegate(s) and Alternate Delegate(s) to the National Republican and Democratic Conventions

State

Senator - Pennsylvania District 43
Representative - Pennsylvania District 34
Attorney General - Pennsylvania
Auditor General - Pennsylvania
Treasurer - Pennsylvania

Local

Republican County Committee Members

If you are already registered to vote as a Democrat or a Republican, you will be able to select your party's candidates for the November General Election from those who have met the petition and other requirements for listing on the Primary ballot. This is where the real action and voter power lies. No one will be on the fall ballot who does not first win in the Primary.

If you are not yet registered, but are an American citizen who will be at least 18 years old by June, 2020; pick up a registration form at the Borough Office or go to www.votespa.com.

Pennsylvania has "closed" primaries, which means that you must enroll in a political party to participate unless there are ballot questions, constitutional amendments, or special election contests. This June, we will not have any of those three categories on the slate. If you would like to register, change your registration, or change your address so that your voice will be heard, you can do so by mail, online, or in person at numerous locations. Detailed instructions can be seen at: www.votespa.com.

Anyone who is incapacitated or expects to be out of town on June 2nd can vote by absentee ballot. The ballot must be voted, returned, and received at the County Election Board by April 28th. Make sure you also get one of these ballots for your "away" college children. They are available at the Churchill Borough Office or the Allegheny County Division of Elections. Start the process early because it involves several steps to complete.

BOROUGH TREE CANOPY IMPORTANCE ELEVATED

As reported in the October 2019 borough newsletter, Churchill's tree canopy was reduced by 48 acres in just five short years from 2010 to 2015 dropping our overall tree coverage to about 50%. More than 30 large trees were removed from the borough in 2019 alone further reducing the canopy that impacts the attractiveness of our borough.

Pittsburgh Magazine developed a report card published in October 2019 grading 130 suburban municipalities outside the city limits. Five factors were used including housing, neighborhood, schools, safety and traffic. One of the criteria in this assessment is "*Land area under tree cover*" as part of the neighborhood grading. Churchill with a tree canopy of 50% is ranked 58th. Nearby Penn Hills (57%), Wilkins Township (56%), Monroeville (55%), and Forest Hills (54%) are all graded higher than Churchill. Given that 10 other municipalities are just within a couple percentage points of Churchill, continued tree loss will further erode our borough's appeal to those reviewing this information when considering moves to our community. Continued tree loss will also exacerbate serious storm water runoff issues.

Recent studies estimate that there are more than 3 trillion trees worldwide and the world's forests absorb about 40% of the nearly 42 billion tons of manmade carbon dioxide or CO₂ each year. 3.5-to-7 billion trees are estimated to be lost each year. Major categories contributing to forest loss beyond natural attrition include timber harvesting, agricultural expansion, wildfires, clearing pathways for mining/extraction, pipelines & power lines, and expansion of roads such as the nearby continued widening of the Pennsylvania Turnpike and plans to extend PA Route 43 Toll Road north to the Parkway East I-376 just east of Churchill.

Global tree count has been estimated to have fallen by almost 50% since the beginning of human civilization. To counter such loss, the World Economic Forum, including the USA, has launched a global initiative to grow, restore and conserve 1 trillion trees around the world by 2050 as announced in Davos, Switzerland at their January 2020 meeting. This effort is proposed in a bid to restore biodiversity and help fight climate change. Naturalist Dr. Jane Goodall said: "*trilliontrees.org offers innovative technologies which will serve to connect tens*

of thousands of small and large groups around the world that are engaged in tree planting and forest restoration.". While this appears to be an unattainable task, its intent is laudable, and our Churchill Tree Committee intends to be one of those "small groups," given our own situation.

To this end, the Churchill Tree Committee has begun interface with Tree Pittsburgh and other outside organizations to initiate tree planting efforts within the borough while working to protect the beautiful tree canopy that remains. Residents have begun to make use of our recently enacted Tree Ordinance, as the Tree Committee is reviewing updates to it based on experience to date, such as to prohibit use of outdated pruning methods, e.g., topping cuts. We also provided more than 90 tree service companies with a copy of our ordinance. More details on these matters, including a way to determine if you have trees in or near a public right-of-way, are provided in a presentation given at the "**IT'S TREE TIME!**" event hosted by the Blackridge Garden Club on February 19, 2020. It has just been reported that the spotted lanternfly (SLF) has been found in Pittsburgh, Monroeville, North Versailles, Wall and Wilmerding. This highly destructive, invasive insect can threaten hickory, maple, pine, poplar, red oak, walnut, willow, apple and other types of trees. More information can be readily found on the internet. If you find SLF in Churchill, please report it immediately to the borough office.

Bulk Collection Reminder:

- Two garbage bags placed outside of the provided container
- Combination of one bulk item and one garbage bag

In addition to the two allowable items (as described in the options above), if you have need for any additional bulk items to be collected on your bulk collection day, you must contact Waste Management to schedule accordingly.

Empty loose recyclables in bin but leave the plastic bag out.



NO Food & liquids
Compost instead! Otherwise, it belongs in the trash.



NO Electronics & Small Appliances
Donate if in good condition, or schedule a bulky item pickup, if available. Check earth911.com for a local drop off site.



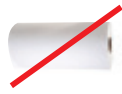
NO Textiles, Bedding, Rugs & Carpet
Donate these items if they are in good condition. Large quantities may require special disposal.



NO Hoses, Holiday Lights, Hangers & Extension Cords
They wrap around equipment and can shut down an entire facility! They all go in the trash.



NO Plastic Bags, Film/Sheeting & Flexible Film Packaging
Take plastic bags back to a local grocer to keep bags clean and dry, and prevent them from shutting down recycling facilities. Visit plasticfilmrecycling.org to find a drop off location near you.



NO Paper Napkins, Plates, Cups & Tissues
Compost if possible, and remember to recycle the cardboard tube.



NO Polystyrene Foam
Foam and plastic to-go containers are not recyclable curbside. Find drop off programs for items like foam packing peanuts at earth911.com.



NO Tires, Auto Parts & Scrap Metal (Including Propane Tanks)
(Not in recycling or trash) Can damage equipment & are safety hazards. Contact local scrap recyclers or retail tire stores for recycling options, or check earth911.com for a drop off center near you.



NO Concrete, Wood & Construction Debris
Can damage equipment & are safety hazards. You may be able to schedule a bulky item pickup - otherwise throw it in the trash or order a roll off bin by contacting Waste Management Customer Service.



NO Yard Waste & Wood
Compost or put in your yard waste cart, if available. Otherwise, it belongs in the trash.



NO Non-Recyclable Plastic
Not everything that is plastic is recyclable! Recycle only food & beverage bottles, jugs and tubs.
